Police are looking for a man who robbed a bank at 14 Mile and Haggerty roads.

Officers were called to the National City bank at about 4 p.m. Monday. Investigators said the man walked into the bank and handed a teller a note demanding cash. After he got an undetermined amount of money, he ran away. No one was injured.

He is described as a in his mid-20s to mid-30s, 5-foot-5 to 5-7 with a medium build. The man was wearing a blue hooded sweatshirt and baggy blue or gray pants. He also was wearing what appeared to be a fake moustache and wig.

Investigators also say the man might have bought gasoline from a Speedway near the bank shortly before the robbery. He might have been driving a dark green Chevrolet Cavalier or Pontiac Sunfire.

MADISON HEIGHTS: Minors' alcohol laws changed

Madison Heights officials voted Monday to amend the city's ordinance governing citations for minors in possession of alcohol.

The change is one that numerous cities and townships are making in Michigan as police and officials react to court decisions that have said that checking minors with a portable breath tester, or PBT, is

illegal without a search warrant or "informed consent" by the minor, Madison Heights Assistant City Attorney Niccolas Grochowski said Tuesday.

Bloomfield Township amended its minor-in-possession ordinance Oct. 26, and other communities have been doing so or plan to, Grochowski said.
